# ARE YOU RAISING A RELATIVE'S CHILD?



## WHAT IS KINSHIP CARE?

A number of grandparents and other relatives (including aunts, uncles, older siblings and great-grandparents) find themselves serving as parents for children whose own parents are unable to care for them. Sometimes, the arrangement (referred to as "kinship care") is an informal, private arrangement between the parents and relative caregivers; in other situations, the Department of Human Services is involved. Kinship care can also include non-relatives such as godparents, stepparents, family-friends or any adult who has a kinship bond with a child.



#### **FACTS ABOUT KINSHIP CARE**

- 2.7 million children (4%) of all U.S. children are being raised in kinship care situations.
- Children placed with relatives make up over a quarter (26%) of all children in the foster care system.

### Resources for Kinship Families

IFAPA provides the following peer support, information, resources, and referrals to community services.

#### **PEER LIAISONS**

IFAPA has Peer Liaisons across lowa. They are currently licensed foster parents and some are adoptive parents. Peer Liaisons provide peer support to foster, adoptive and kinship parents in their assigned areas. They are available by phone, email, and at IFAPA events as an on-going source of information and support. They understand the child welfare system, the needs of children who do not live at home, and have experience with the challenges and joys of parenting these children.

#### RESOURCE INFORMATION SPECIALIST

Our Resource Information Specialist can help families successfully meet the challenges of parenting the children placed in their home through telephone support, educational materials, knowledge of available services, and connections to other families.

#### TRAININGS FOR KINSHIP PARENTS

IFAPA understands the children in your care may have special emotional, cognitive, physical and behavioral needs you may have never encountered or may feel ill-equipped to handle. IFAPA offers a variety of continuing education trainings designed to help you deal with the daily needs of your child, work more effectively with the child's birth parent(s) as well as feel more connected to other parents going through a similar experience as your own. Training can be obtained through our two-hour, three-hour, and six-hour trainings plus yearly state conference. These are listed in our newsletters, training booklets and on the IFAPA website. They are free of charge except for the spring conference and CPR and First Aid trainings.

#### SUPPORT GROUPS

IFAPA has 50 affiliated support groups throughout the state to support foster, adoptive, and kinship families. Each group has its own leadership and is structured to best meet the needs of the families in that area. Some groups have monthly meetings with support only, some have support and training, some have training only, and some also have special outings or events for their families. You can find a map and listing of the current support groups on the IFAPA website under the "Support" tab. If there are a number of kinship families in a given area who would like to organize a group specifically for kin families, IFAPA can provide assistance in the creation of such a group.

#### **IFAPA WEBSITE**

The IFAPA website (www.ifapa.org) serves as a resource for families. Parents can access upcoming training dates, information on kinship resources, events, support groups, names of therapists, publications, links to other helpful websites and more.



#### **IFAPA PUBLICATIONS**

IFAPA publishes a variety of resource materials for foster, adoptive and kinship parents to assist them in understanding procedures of DHS and to enhance their parenting skills. IFAPA has a publication that is specific to kinship caregivers: Raising Relative's Children - This guidebook was created to help lowa kinship caretakers navigate the DHS and Juvenile Court systems when they are caring for a relative's child. The booklet includes information on the different types of care a kinship caretaker can provide, financial assistance programs, community resources, and questions to ask DHS when considering a kinship placement. This booklet also includes information on children's issues, family concerns, respite, educational issues, raising children of color, talking with children about their parents and much more helpful information.

#### **IFAPA NEWSLETTERS**

IFAPA produces the News and Views newsletter on a quarterly basis. Policy updates, peer support, training opportunities and resources relating to foster, adoptive and kinship families are core subjects of this newsletter. IFAPA also produces a weekly newsletter, the Weekly Word, that is sent electronically to all IFAPA members. This newsletter contains information regarding IFAPA's programs, training and other information helpful to foster, adoptive and kinship families.
