Mental Health First Aid: Depression / Suicidal Behavior

(Session 1 of 4 - This workshop is a four-part series, attendees are encouraged, but not required to attend all four sessions. Those who attend all 4 sessions will be certified in mental health first aid) This workshop is a 12-hour training course designed to give members of the public key skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. The evidence behind the program demonstrates that it makes people feel more comfortable managing a crisis situation and builds mental health literacy — helping the public identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness. The potential risk factors and warning signs for a range of mental health problems, including: depression, anxiety/trauma, psychosis and psychotic disorders, eating disorders, substance use disorders, and self-injury. In this training course, you will learn a 5-step action plan encompassing the skills, resources and knowledge to assess the situation, to select and implement appropriate interventions, and to help the individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional care.

During Session 1, you will learn about mental health problems in the US. This workshop will help you will develop a better understanding of Depression and suicidal behaviors, including what depression symptoms and suicidal behaviors to watch for. You will learn how to develop a mental health first aid action plan to help the individual in crisis receive the appropriate professional care. *(Approved for CEUs)*

Trainer: Diane Johnson

Diane Johnson is a pharmacist by trade, college instructor by choice, and a mental health consumer/family advocate by design. She is presently working toward her Master of Arts in Psychology with an emphasis on Behavioral Health from Northcentral University. She received her Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy from Drake University in 1981. Diane's adventures in to the realms of mental illness began with her daughter's early diagnosis of disorganized-schizophrenia. She has combined her previous experience in pharmacy and academia, her personal experience of raising a child with a severe mental illness and has become a consumer/family voice for recovery and resiliency. Diane is certified facilitator for Mental Health First Aide, Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP), NAMI's "Visions for Tomorrow", "Family to Family", and "Parents and Teachers as Allies". She travels the state with a variety of recovery presentations that have been shared with over two hundred audiences, from parent support groups and regional conferences to State Legislators and Commissions.

Dr. Warren Phillips is a Licensed Psychologist and owner of Central Iowa Psychological Services, a group psychological practice with locations in Ames and West Des Moines, Iowa. Dr. Phillips is also a Senior Lecturer and clinical supervisor in the Department of Psychology at Iowa State University. In his practice, he provides psychological evaluations and psychotherapy to children as young as age 3, adolescents, adults, families, and couples. His areas of specialty include working with children, adolescents, and adults who have numerous neuro-biological disorders including attention-deficit disorder, learning disabilities, bipolar disorder, autism-spectrum disorders, and obsessive-compulsive disorders. Dr. Phillips also specializes in the assessment and treatment of children's behavior problems, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, and adjustment difficulties due to abuse, bereavement, or divorce.

Dr. Joann Seeman Smith is a Licensed Mental Health Counselor who specializes in diagnosis, and treatment of children and adolescents with attention-deficit disorder, learning disabilities, autism-spectrum disorders, behavior problems, depression and bipolar disorder, anxiety, and adjustment difficulties due to abuse, bereavement, or divorce. Dr. Seeman Smith specializes in treatment of preschool age children (as young as age 2), school age children, and teens. In addition to standard short-term and traditional talk therapies, Dr. Seeman Smith has expertise in using play therapy approaches with children, teens, and families, including children and families with attachment-based difficulties. Dr. Seeman Smith works full time as an LMHC at Central Iowa Psychological Services.

Have you heard the hype around Family Interaction and wondered what your expectations as a foster parent are in the Family Interaction Process? This course will teach you about the Family Interaction Plan, the different phases of Family Interaction and the roles of the members of the planning team. You will come away more secure in your responsibilities as a team member and with a better understanding of how Family Interaction can help the children in your care.

Nicole Button works for the Iowa Department of Human Services as the Family Team Meeting Coordinator for the Des Moines Service Area. In her role she works to support and develop the Family Team Meeting philosophy and put into practice with the Family Interaction model. Caring for Children with HIV

This training will enable foster and adoptive parents to respond sensitively, compassionately, and competently to HIV-affected children and their families. Participants will learn how to engage confidently in infection-control precautions; respond appropriately and sensitively to concerns about HIV transmission; provide appropriate care and support during each stage of the “roller coaster” of HIV disease; anticipate and manage the challenges of confidentiality surrounding HIV disease; and join as a part of a care giving team that responds effectively to cultural differences, social burdens, daily problems, grief and loss issues, and the needs of caregivers. Participants will also receive a brief overview of the Iowa DHS HIV Protocols on confidentiality, testing, and placement of HIV-infected children.

Trainer: Nancy Magnall

Nancy Magnall has been employed as a Resource Information Specialist with IFAPA since 2000. In this position, Nancy develops resources and provides training, information, and support to foster families and families who have adopted from foster care. For the past 15 years she has also been an HIV/AIDS Educator and Consultant educating groups and individuals about pediatric HIV/AIDS and caring for children with HIV disease. She and her husband Paul have been foster parents for 20 years and have adopted one child from foster care. She is a graduate of the University of Northern Iowa.

This workshop will also teach you more about substance abuse disorders, including symptoms of overdose and withdrawal. You will learn how to develop a mental health first aid action plan to help the individual in crisis receive the appropriate professional care. This training explores the impact Vicarious Traumatization has on the trauma foster/adoptive parent and the importance of utilizing the self-care techniques needed to minimize secondary trauma. Lecture, interactive exercises, and group discussions are the learning techniques used by presenter. By session end, you will be able to 1. Define Vicarious Traumatization, 2. Understand the impact secondary trauma has on you, 3. Identify the signs and symptoms of Vicarious Traumatization and 4. The Care and Feeding of a Juvenile Court Judge

Ever wonder what your role as a foster parent is when it comes to juvenile court proceedings? In this session, Judge Constance Cohen will share with foster parents what information they should share with judges, and how they should share it. Also, when should foster parents attend court on behalf of the children in their care? How should they prepare the children in their care for court, and when should the child attend court? What does the court expect of foster parents when working with birth families around Family Interaction? In addition, learn basic skills to testifying in court and role play various situations. This session will address these pertinent issues and so many more!

Trainer: Judge Constance Cohen

Judge Constance Cohen was appointed to the Juvenile Court bench in the Fifth Judicial District of Iowa in 1994. Her jurisdiction includes dependency, delinquency, termination of parental rights, involuntary juvenile commitments, and adoption. Judge Cohen received Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctorate of Jurisprudence degrees from Drake University. Prior to attending Law School in 1984, she was an elementary school teacher and administrator. Professional experience includes private practice, prosecution, prosecuting attorneys' training coordination for the Iowa Attorney General, and adjunct professor at Drake University Law School and Des Moines Area Community College. She is a former member of the Board of Trustees of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, and continues to serve on the Permanency Planning Committee. Other professional activities include Lead Judge, Model Court Project, Chair of the Juvenile Court Committee of the Iowa Judges Assn., Lead Faculty, 2005 Child Abuse and Neglect Institute (NCJFCJ), Member of the Court Improvement Project Oversight Committee, National Assn. of Women Judges, Polk County Women Attorneys, and Iowa State Bar Assn.

Mandatory Child Abuse Reporter Training

This is the state approved Mandatory Child Abuse Reporter Training that is required for foster parents to complete within the first 6 months of being licensed, and then every five years thereafter. In addition, the Foster Allegation Information Resource (FAIR) program will be discussed. This is an IFAPA program that provides information and support to foster parents who have had an allegation of abuse made against them.

Trainer: Steven Hayward

Steven Hayward works in Protective Services with the Iowa Department of Human Services as an Assessor of Child Abuse and Adult Abuse. He was named the state Program Manager for Child Protective Services in 1997, served as Policy and Procedure Training Instructor for Iowa DHS Child Abuse and Dependent Adult Abuse Core Courses, and is a founding Director and former Vice-President of "Children First – Children Cope with Divorce". Mr. Hayward has compiled the training booklet "Child Abuse and Dependent Adult Abuse – A Guide for Mandatory Reporters".

Keeping Children Safer in Care

Are you fostering a child prone to running away? Are you concerned for the safety of the children in your care? This session is brought to IFAPA from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and will address the safety issues of abduction, exploitation, run-away and "throw away children" in out-of-home care. Information about children who runaway and the effect trauma has on child development. We will look at the importance of visitation as well as the common traits of parents who abduct their children. Parenting tips and resources will be shared, as well as identifying skills children need to take responsibility for their own safety. *(Approved for CEUs)*
