A PROCLAMATION

NATIONAL FOSTER CARE MONTH, 2013

As a Nation, we have no task more important than ensuring our children grow up healthy and safe. It is a promise we owe to the hundreds of thousands of youth in foster care -- boys and girls who too often go without the love, protection, and stability of a permanent family. This month, we recommit to giving them that critical support, and we recognize the foster parents and professionals who work every day to lift up the children in their care toward a bright, productive future.

Thanks to those efforts, the number of young people in foster care is falling and fewer children are waiting for adoption. But even now, more than 400,000 kids are looking for permanency with caring parents. Many are struggling to find the meaningful, long-term relationships that will help them transition into adulthood. Some young men and women are aging out of the system without a permanent home, making it harder for them to get a good education, find a job, and build a better life.

To give foster youth the support they need, Americans in every community are stepping up to serve. They are mentors, teachers, faith leaders, caseworkers, advocates, family members -- individuals dedicated to making a difference. As they lend their strength to our most vulnerable children, my Administration will continue to invest in services that strengthen the foster care system and encourage adoption. We will keep working to ensure every qualified caregiver has the chance to be an adoptive or foster parent. And we will support programs that help increase permanency, reduce rates of re-entry into foster care, and address the issues that bring young people in the child welfare system in the first place.

Whether as a friend, a role model, or a guardian, any of us can be a supportive adult for a child in need. As we honor the countless Americans who are answering that call to action, let us mark this month by showing children and youth in foster care the best our country has to offer.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim May 2013 as National Foster Care Month. I call upon all

Americans to observe this month by taking time to help youth in foster care and recognizing the commitment of all who touch their lives at a most challenging time.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this thirtieth day of April, in the year of our Lord two thousand thirteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-seventh.

Power Through Choices

Power Through Choices (PTC) is a 10-session prevention curriculum for adolescents, ages 13-18, living in out-of-home care. It has two main themes: self-empowerment and the impact of choices on an individual's future. It is designed to help youth prevent pregnancy, HIV, and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Buena Vista University (Storm Lake, IA) is one of 30 Institutions nationwide and the only one in Iowa to provide the Guardian's Scholars program (GS). The GS program provides resources and supports to students that age out of the foster care system in Iowa. The Guardian's Scholars program seeks to provide financial assistance, social and academic supports, and a close personal mentor that will help the recipients meet their individual needs. The GS program includes:

- Year-round housing: Young adults who age out of the foster care system generally do not
 have the ability to find, fund or return to a suitable housing atmosphere after the completion
 of an academic year. Participants of the GS will be provided year-round housing on the
 Storm Lake Campus of BV.
- Application and Orientation Visit Costs: These fees will be waived for all applicants whom
 age-out of the lowa Foster Care system. Housing deposits will be paid from program funds
 of the GS.
- Summer Employment/Work Study: Buena Vista University will provide employment for all GS participants. The income generated by summer employment is paid directly to the GS participant. GS participants are responsible for preparation of their own personal meals during the summer break, clothing and all personal needs. Income generated from the academic year work-study will be credited to the student financial aid package.
- Academic Supports: GS participants will receive an annual stipend for the purchase of textbooks, general school supplies, lab fees and other associated items purchased from the University. Allowances are given if the campus book store is unable to provide these items.
- Faculty Mentoring: GS participants will be partnered with experts in their given field of study. A strength of the BVU experience is the ability of our students to work shoulder-toshoulder with experts in their chosen field of study. This collaborative experience is a pillar of the BVU academic model.
- Career Planning and Professional Coaching: The Office of Career Services (OCS) provides
 personalized career counseling to facilitate a holistic approach to life planning. The OCS
 promotes systematic career inquiries and provides a comprehensive program that includes
 self-assessment tools, exploration resources and programs, internship coordination, and
 recruiting services for RS participants.
- Counseling: GS participants are provided professional and confidential personal counseling services without cost to participants. The Counseling Office provides additional educational programming, treatment referrals, support group development and consultation services.
- Spiritual Life/Campus Ministry: The campus Chaplin seeks to nurture the spiritual growth, enhance faith development, strengthen connections through intentional dialogue & engage GS participants in the world that surrounds them.
- Academic Specific Supports: The Center for Academic Excellence (CAE) will provide GS
 participants with reasonable accommodations to meet their specific academic needs. The
 CAE also provides an individualized approach to achieving academic success through peer
 tutoring.
- Retention Services: The Director of Retention Services will monitor all GS participants. The director will personally visit, discuss and work to solve the unique challenges that face GS participants. The Director of Retention Services will be responsible, in consultation with Student Services, to manage that appropriate social, academic and spiritual supports are provided to GS participants.
- The University will work to identify current students from foster care and develop a peermentoring program for new students entering the program.
